

Use Live Captions to Better Understand Audio




Live Caption automatically captions speech live on your screen. You can use it on media like videos, audio, podcasts, phone calls, video calls, and audio messages.

Live captioning is available in Google Chrome (recommended browser for online courses) and Windows 11, version 22H2 & later.





Use Live Caption in Google Chrome

You can turn on Live Caption for media you play in Chrome. Live Caption is only available in English.



1. On your computer, open Chrome .
2. At the top right, click **More**  > **Settings**.
3. At the bottom of the Settings page, click **Accessibility** .
4. Turn on **Live Caption**.

Tips:

- When you play a video, turn on captions at the top right and click **Media control** .
- To use live captions for videos that autoplay, turn on the video volume.
- When you click away from the tab with sound, live captions will appear in a hover-bubble that you can drag. To return to the tab with audio, click .

Use Live Captions on Windows 11 (version 22H2 & later)

Transcribe every piece of dialogue played on your Windows computer. Live Captions supports multiple languages.

1. Open the **Settings** app.
2. Choose the **Accessibility**  section on the left-side menu.
3. Click **Captions** .
4. Change the **Live captions** toggle to **On**.

When turned on the first time, live captions will prompt you to download live captions language files to be used by on-device speech recognition. If your language is not available, you can use another language during setup. Voice data will be processed locally, and your data isn't shared to the cloud.

Tips:

- After installing Live Captions, turn it on by pressing **Windows logo key**  + **Ctrl + L**.
- To move the box, click the gear icon in the top right corner and choose Position, then where you want the box to be. You can put it at the bottom of the screen or turn it into a floating panel you can drag anywhere.
